Registration and Advising

Fall 2024 registration opened today! As you are meeting with your advisees who need to register for a MATH course, here are some "Math Readiness" highlights to assist in your advising:

- Math 111 (for Math 124 and 125) and Math 115 (for Math 119) are no longer required, but some students should still consider taking them.
- Math 111 and 115 are still recommended for some students. These students roughly align with students with Math Readiness Scores of 1.0 or 2.0 (go to "Advisee Test Scores" on Banner to see the Math Readiness Score).
 - o Not every student has a Math Readiness Score
- Math 111 is now designed to be helpful if taken prior to Math 124/125 OR if taken concurrently with Math 124/125. Math 115 is still designed to be most helpful if taken before Math 119, but a student could sign up concurrently if they wished.
- To help students decide if they should consider Math 111 or Math 115, here are some statistics from past semesters. Here are how students with a Math Readiness Score of 1.0 or 2.0 do in Math 124 (other courses have similar results):
 - o 5% get an A in Math 124 (compared to 17% of all other students),

- $\circ~~$ 23% get at least a B in Math 124 (this compares with 55% of all other students), and
- o 68% get at least a C in Math 124 (compared with 89% of all other students).

This is a pilot that will allow data to be gathered and calibrated for which students will benefit from Math 111 and Math 115, as it is likely these requirements will be reintroduce in later semesters if we find we can identify students who need Math 111 or Math 115.

The survey is conducted by XPD and results are compiled during a 12-month period that begins at graduation.

Call for Proposals for the 2024-2025 Emerging Scholars Program

The Office of Undergraduate Research & Scholars is now accepting proposals for our next cohort of the Emerging Scholars Program for the Academic Year of 2024-25. If you are interested in mentoring an Emerging Scholar and have a well-designed project, please considering applying <u>here.</u> **Priority faculty deadline is May 1.**

What is the Emerging Scholars Program?

- The Emerging Scholars (ES) Program exposes underrepresented students to three highimpact practices over the course of their first year at CSB and SJU: undergraduate research, learning communities, and on-campus student employment.
- The students selected for this program will be paired with a faculty mentor that is committed to working with underrepresented students and our program's mission of making undergraduate research accessible to students from all backgrounds.
- Students selected to be an ES will be offered a full-time, paid, on-campus student employment position (10 hours per week) for the entire academic year under the mentorship of a faculty mentor.
- The student will assist their faculty mentor with hands-on research or creative work, will have access to personal and professional development and networking opportunities, and will be a part of a unique learning community that will foster a sense of belonging on campus.
- Faculty mentors participating in the program will also receive a stipend for the meaningful time they invest with their mentee.

Proposals are being evaluated on the following criteria:

- **1.** A well-designed proposal that outlines:
 - a. Project abstract
 - b. Summary of goals
 - **c.** Student tasks: tasks should be reasonable, but meaningful for a first-year student to take on.
 - **d.** Areas of Skills & Knowledge that the Scholar will explore and learn over the course of the year that will be transferable to future research or creative work.
- 2. A plan for meaningful mentorship of an underrepresented student.
- **3.** A Statement on Diversity/Inclusion. The statement should outline the faculty member's commitment to learning, serving, and mentoring underrepresented students, as well as a commitment to promoting undergraduate research as an accessible and inclusive high impact practice at CSB/SJU.
