

The Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, part of the Rubenstein Arts Access Program, is generously funded by **David M. Rubenstein**.

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

This production is entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). The aims of this national theater education program are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.





DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Three American Victorian women set out to explore Terra Incognita. Their journey is a mythical one spanning over sixty years, through jungle, desert, swamp, mountaintops, ice-fields until finally they arrive in the 1950s. One of the three women is an anthropologist. One likes to climb mountains and is obsessed with words, their meaning and their sounds. The third woman is all-American and believes everyone in the world should speak English. Why do two of the women fall in love with the 1950s? That is a perfect time to live in if you believe the 1950s were when America was Great. Why would a white woman leave the deep seated beliefs of that era behind if she could avoid a future of racism, multiple nuclear powers, Aids, single-sex marriage, and environmental disasters?

Are only some people like Oedipus who must keep pursuing the truth no matter where it leads? Have we exhausted our natural courage and curiosity? Why are only some people able to see that we are truly, On the Verge?
